Of the five interns I worked with in the past decade, three are currently in the UCC's Search and Call process. I am a reference for each of them and as the committees of these progressive, forward thinking, justice-based churches call me to ask what I think about their potential candidate, I get so excited. I get excited because all of these people are still considered young adults, they are all queer, they are all brilliant, and they all have such a deep and abiding commitment to see the church live into its next incarnation.

As I speak about the various gifts these candidates possess, and there are many, I am reminded of my own hopes for the church, for the churches they will serve, and for our church which just one year ago called me to serve.

I knew it was a "Call" because of one answer: When I asked in my first face-to-face conversation with the committee why on earth I should walk away from a comfortable position serving a church I loved, where my gifts were deeply valued, uproot my family, and walk into the unknown, the answer was, "Because we're ready!"

I believe we are ready. Together we have been through the refiner's fire this year and emerged clearer than ever before. We are clear that there is a unique role in this valley for First Congregational Church, Sonoma, United Church of Christ. We are called to offer something here that isn't being found anywhere else: a polyvalence of the Sacred which we will communicate by all means necessary. This church is a place for people to experience the reality that there is no division between everyday life and a life in God. We are in a powerful position to model what it looks like to live into hard questions with love, transparency, and integrity. And in every aspect of our lives together we must be vigilant not to slip into complacency, but to stay ever mindful of our goals: to make God manifest in the world through radical inclusion, to fight against injustice, and to live joyfully.

We want our congregation to be filled with song and laughter and joy for the road ahead. Because justice work is hard work and the road is long, we have to dig in deep and help one another draw on all our resources. Nothing about what is offered on Sundays or throughout the week ought to be understood as a spectator sport. Being the church in this moment in time is about full engagement of **all** the people.

Let this church be known as the Justice and Joy church, as the intersection of God and what's-happening-now church, and as the church where all are welcome and seen and heard.

Message from the Moderator

Discussion of the Report *Hidden in Plain Sight* Notes from the 7/8/2017 FCCS Leadership Retreat

The FCCS Council members and committee chairs who gathered on July 8 for our biannual Leadership Retreat are grateful to FCCS member Katherine Fulton and her colleague Nancy Ramsey for joining us to discuss their excellent report, *Hidden in Plain Sight*. Sponsored by the Community Foundation and Sonoma Valley Fund, the report reviews the data that detail Sonoma Valley's needs as well as its charitable resources.

The good news is that the philanthropic sector in the Valley is large and growing. The issues exposed in the report, however, reveal that charitable giving is focused on a few limited areas like youth education and healthcare. Other areas, especially those impacted by the Valley's rapid growth in population and deepening poverty, are in dire need of both private and government support. Pressing needs include services to low income seniors and especially, what the report and retreat participants agreed to be the #1 area of need: low income, affordable housing.

The reports value lies in the actionable data that will help local government, donors, and nonprofits strategize more effectively to address Sonoma Valley needs. Retreat participants discussed how the extended nonprofit community, including FCCS, has to come together with each other and with local government to build solutions for greater impact. We also acknowledged the importance of developing more effective ways to lobby state and federal government for better solutions to address the deepening poverty gap.

An excellent written response to the report from John Donnelly was shared and discussed at the retreat. John urges further consideration of underlying structural-systemic factors contributing to the challenges of Sonoma Valley. He calls out the "neoliberal ideology that has dominated government policy-making over the past several decades, privatizing many public functions while further eroding the public sector's capacities." He suggests policies and actions that might address problem areas identified in the report. For example, a few of his recommendations to address affordable housing include lobbying to:

- Eliminate federal tax deductions for second homes' mortgage interest rates
- Reform Proposition 13 to increase the property tax rate on second homes
- Re-allocate more of the Tourist Occupancy Tax away from tourist promotions to provide affordable housing
- Increase the minimum wage and adopt living wage rates

Other ideas discussed at the retreat that Committees and Council will consider over the next months:

- Continuing to strengthen the FCCS partnership with the North Bay Organizing Project
- 2. Connecting the Earth Care Advocates and Sonoma Valley Climate Coalition with other action groups for impact throughout the Valley
- Sponsoring issue-oriented shared meals for local government workers, service providers, non-profit leaders, and funders.
- 4. Patronizing Latino-owned stores in the Springs.
- 5. Asking each of our FCCS committees to examine their priorities and work to make sure that our interests, projects, and plans represent multicultural perspectives and voices.
- 6. Continuing classes and workshops on white privilege and appreciation for diversity

- 7. Asking each of our FCCS committees to examine their priorities and work to make sure that our interests, projects, and plans represent multicultural perspectives and voices.
- 8. Continuing classes and workshops on white privilege and appreciation for diversity
- 9. Consider offering a Spanish language acquisition course at FCCS.
- 10. Continuing focus on social justice through book and article discussion groups.
- 11. Offer free canned food donations at the Thrift Shop for some of our regular customers.
- 12. Continue to look for opportunities to share common interests and priorities with our expanded neighborhood community.

Much more was discussed in what turned out to be an all too brief period of time for the Retreat. In the afternoon, council members and committee chairs discussed how to connect better with our new FCCS members; what we might do more and differently to assure a successful Stewardship campaign, and how to move forward on becoming a Creation Justice Church. In the months to come, Committees and Council will consider these and other ideas raised in the discussion.

We have made a procedural change in our accounting practices and have engaged the services of Bob Withrow, CPA, to get and keep our financial books in order. The Withrows have served the church in the past and have welcomed us back. We will benefit greatly from their expertise.

Your generosity makes the work of our church possible. FCC abounds in energy and excitement these days. We are faced with a major (about \$20,000) water project to replace our aging and crumbling water pipes, and our sanctuary renovation fund is about \$12,000 short of our goal plus the renovation revealed major heating duct replacement work that cost an additional \$11,600. Monthly Hint from the Earth Care Committee

Keep your refrigerator cool...but not too cool!

Set the temperature of your refrigerator between 1 – 4 °C and your freezer at -18°C. For every degree lower, you increase energy consumption by around 5% – without making any difference as to how well the food is preserved. Also, remember to dust the coils of your refrigerator to keep it running efficiently. Dusty coils can waste as much as 30% extra electricity. Your freezer runs most efficiently if it is full, so consider adding bottles filled with water if it is not full.

Fellowship Time (aka Coffee Hour) is Changing!

The Hospitality Committee is revising how we coordinate Fellowship Time (also known as Coffee Hour) after the 10:30 a.m. service each Sunday.

We hope you'll work with us as Fellowship Time evolves, and together we can create a warm and welcoming environment for our congregation, guests, and visitors.

On Sunday, Aug. 6, Hospitality will host Fellowship Time after the 10:30 a.m. service with a cake for the August birthdays. Then we will take a break for the rest of August, with **no food or coffee Aug. 13, 20, and 27**, while we work out our new system. Instead, we will have pitchers of water and (recyclable) paper cups at the back of the Sanctuary Aug. 13, 20, and 27.

Starting in September, Hospitality will host Fellowship Time on the first Sunday of each month. The other Sundays, Hospitality will provide light snacks (nuts, trail mix, crackers, etc.). People will be free to bring refreshments for special occasions, but we will not be recruiting folks to provide food every Sunday.

Instead, teams of volunteers (up to six people per team) will be responsible for setup and cleanup. How often a team will do setup and cleanup will depend on how many teams we get. We're hoping to sign up eight or more teams, with up to six members on a team. It only takes two to three people to do setup and cleanup, so a team with six members could take turns, and one team member might only have to be responsible for Fellowship Time a few times a year.

We're contacting folks by email already, and signup sheets will be available starting Sunday, Aug. 5.
