## Notes from the Pastor

As we walk slowly through these Lenten weeks that lead us into deeper reflection on our way to celebrating the emergent new life within and around us, I offer you, Beloved, a few reflections from the retreats I have been participating in these past couple of months.

The first retreat in mid-January was with a group of Clergy Women who are deeply engaged in Parker Palmer's "Courage" work (<http://www.couragerenewal.org/parker/>). Rev. Alan Claassen introduced some elements of this work during his tenor at FCC, and I sneak it in whenever I can. The work is based on developing circles of trust. Trust takes time, and the group of which I am a part has been meeting together for ten years. On our retreat, we examined the idea that we serve a holy Mystery.

"The G-d we serve is like an eternal lake whose waters are always calm and clear like glass, reflecting truth to all who gaze upon them. A million, million reflections and the lake remains the same. It is not your job to stir the waters but to show the way to the lakeside." *The Art of Pastoring* by William Martin

The second retreat, in late January, was with a different group of clergy with whom I trained at the national CREDO event sponsored by the UCC several years back. We meet once a year to talk, pray, eat, and share best practices. This year, we spent lots of time walking along the edge of the ocean in Carmel and sharing our joys, hopes, sorrows and dreams.

I was reminded that this is exactly what Jesus did with his disciples; they regularly broke bread and walked together along the shores sharing insights and heartaches. It sounds simple, but I am reminded of the importance of taking time to really connect with one another. At the heart of discipleship is walking together - sharing mountaintops and valleys with one another as we go through this lifetime together. I encourage you to take some long walks with friends this month.

Lastly, I went to an amazing new center for renewal called Multiversity 1440 (<https://1440.org/>). It is a remarkable place nestled in the Santa Cruz mountains. There I was able to partake in some of the leading thinking around community development, civil conversation, and spiritual depth. The convener of the event was Krista Tippett whose company, "On Being" (<https://onbeing.org/>), is producing the most listen worthy podcasts on the air. Much of the event was taped and I hope you will listen to the wide variety of voices who spoke about the importance of finding joy in the struggle for justice and peace. Here are a few tidbits that stood out to me:

- We want the world to recover its capacity for lightness and joy. We cannot call it forth in others without embodying it ourselves.
- Always be more generous than you think you can be.
- All deep friendships are based on mutual forgiveness.

I am truly grateful for your support of my own personal and professional development. I feel fed and nourished and ready to walk beside you toward the Easter Season, when again we will remember our own call to be people of the Resurrection.

May the mysteries of the Spirit bless and keep you always, Rev. Curran

### Sign Up for 100% Renewable Energy with Sonoma Clean Power's Evergreen Plan

A large majority of Sonoma County residents already have switched from PG&E to Sonoma Clean Power's 42% renewable energy. However, only 1% of Sonoma County residents have signed up for the Evergreen plan — the 100% renewable (geothermal) energy package that also is available from SCP. Let's be part of the solution and increase that renewable percentage today!

## Stewardship

### The Meaning of Stewardship

Most of us are members of a number of different groups or institutions. For example, I am a member of Costco, belong to Body Fusion Sonoma, and my monthly book group. I volunteer weekly as a member of Jack London Park Partners and the Friends of the Library. I am also a member of the First Congregational Church Sonoma. How is my membership in the church different than all of my other memberships?

My 40-year association with FCC involves true stewardship. When most people hear the word "stewardship," often in an annual appeal, they brace themselves and their wallet, either to open it or to get a firmer grip. Many definitions of the word *stewardship* involve the words "control, organization, supervising, and managing." To a large extent, those words are appropriate. However, the definition of stewardship that particularly meets my beliefs comes from dictionary.com: "*The responsibility of overseeing and protection of something worth caring for and preserving.*"

As a member of Costco or Body Fusion, I get benefits of belonging as long as I pay my money. In volunteering with Jack London Park Partners and the Friends of the Library, I am putting action into my beliefs about the importance of those institutions. My membership in the church, however, involves purpose. Richard J. Leider, author of *The Power of Purpose*, identifies purpose as "... a goal outside of ourselves" and that "only when our focus is larger than ourselves can meaning be deeply savored and long lasting, not just a goal completed and then forgotten." To me, stewardship in the truest sense involves far more than just opening my wallet during pledge season. It involves standing side by side with other members in the beliefs of our church whether it be earth care, social action or caring for each other.

In the coming months, I hope you will consider being part of a Moment of Mission during the 10:30 service and offer a glimpse of what stewardship in FCC means to you. We are all members of this little church on West Spain Street and sharing how we find purpose in this aspect of our life will bring meaning to all of us.
